

High School Pipeline, 2022-23

Data Briefing October 30, 2023

Context

SDCCD strives to provide educational opportunities for the diverse student population in the San Diego region. One type of students targeted by outreach and support programs like Promise is **First Time Entrants**, or First Time Students who enroll at one of the credit colleges in the year following high school graduation.

This briefing provides context on the number of First Time Entrants from San Diego Unified School District (SDUSD) high schools, and the percent of high school graduates that these students represent. Also included First Time Entrant data showing:

- The percent of all first-time to college students accounted for by First Time Entrants
- The number from non-SDUSD districts
- First Time Entrant rates by college, including the number and percent of students from one college's service area who enroll at one of the other two credit colleges
- The number and percent of First Time Entrants who participate in Promise
- A high-level analysis of demographic trends

This briefing represents a preliminary analysis of First Time Entrant rates for SDUSD high schools to inform conversations about outreach. Further analysis will follow in subsequent years that considers First Time Entrant rates by major, first-generation status, early college credit completion, and more.

This briefing includes data for students who were First Time Entrants in 2020-21, 2021-22, and 2022-23.

Definitions

- Academic Year: Subsequent Summer, Fall, and Spring terms, including Intersession. For example, Summer 2020, Fall 2020, and Spring 2021 are the 2020-21 academic year.
- **First Time to College**: A student whose first enrollment at a post-secondary institution occurred at San Diego City, Mesa, or Miramar colleges.
- **First Time Entrant**: A student whose first enrollment at a post-secondary institution occurred at San Diego City, Mesa, or Miramar colleges in the year following high school graduation. For example, a student who graduated high school in 2020 and enrolled at San Diego City, Mesa, or Miramar colleges during the 2020-21 academic year.

Summary

- 1. **Population Context:** Recent high school graduates first-time entrants have accounted for about half of all first-time to college students over the last three years.
- 2. **First Time Entrant Counts by School District:** There were 3,620 First Time Entrants in 2022-23, 7% more than the prior year. SDUSD public schools accounted for 1,436 of these students (40% of First Time Entrants).

Key Finding: SDUSD Public and Charter schools accounted for just under half of First Time Entrants in 2022-23 (46%). Schools from districts outside of the immediate San Diego area accounted for the next largest group of entrants in 2022-23 (850 students, or 23%), followed by Poway Unified (470 students, or 13%) and Sweetwater Union (306, or 8%).

3. **SDUSD First Time Entrant Rate**: About one in five high school seniors enroll at San Diego City, Mesa, or Miramar College in the year following high school graduation. Entrant rates vary widely by high school. Sites geographically near a credit college, such as Mira Mesa and Kearny, show the highest re-enrollment rates.

Key Finding: High-enrollment sites with low entrant rates may benefit from more or different outreach services than they currently receive. These sites are listed in Table 5 on page 9. It should be noted that sites such as Morse and Henry likely demonstrate low entrant rates due to geographical proximity to other community college districts.

4. **Entrant Rate by College**: In 2022-23, Entrant rates to each of the credit colleges from their service area high schools ranged between 13% and 20% (City: 13%, Mesa: 18%, Miramar: 20%). Seniors from high schools in each college's service area primarily enroll as Entrants at that college: between 68% and 90% of First Time Entrants enrolled at their service area college.

Key Finding: As many as half of entrants from each college's service area also enrolled at one of the other two credit colleges in their first year.

See the end of this briefing for college-specific worksheets about the number of Entrants from each college's service area who enroll at that college.

5. **Promise Participation among First Time Entrants**: Of the 1,434 First Time Entrants in 2022-23, 828 participated in Promise, or 58%. This is an increase from the prior two years (2020-21: 53%, 2021-22: 51%).

Key Finding: In 2022-23, more than half of First Time Entrants from 15 of the 22 SDUSD Public high schools participated in Promise in their first year as college students at SDCCD.

6. **First Time Entrants by Gender and Ethnicity**: Nearly half of first-time Entrants in 2022-23 were Latinx (47%), and male students accounted for a lightly larger percent (50%) than female students (48%). Compared to all other students enrolled at the credit colleges, First Time Entrants were more likely to be Latinx (+9%) less likely to be white (-8%), and slightly more likely to be male (+2) than all other students.

Key Findings and Next Steps

Outreach to SDUSD schools in the SDCCD service area will remain a priority for each of the colleges. Context about the number of non-SDUSD students who are First Time Entrants is helpful for informing conversations about setting goals and program capacity.
High-enrollment sites with low entrant rates may benefit from more or different outreach services than they currently receive. These sites are listed in Table 5 on page 9. It should be noted that sites such as Morse and Henry likely demonstrate low entrant rates due to geographical proximity to other community college districts.	SDUSD sites are extremely diverse and reasons for low entrant rates vary by site, from geographical proximity to SDCCD or other colleges to rates of enrollment in 4-year universities at each site. Outreach efforts respond, or at least consider, these differences.
As many as half of entrants from each college's service area also enrolled at one of the other two credit colleges in their first year.	As online course offerings facilitate student enrollment at multiple colleges, clarity in degree requirements and course availability across the credit colleges are more important than ever.
In 2022-23, more than half of First Time Entrants from 15 of the 22 SDUSD Public high schools participated in Promise in their first year as college students at SDCCD.	Sites such as Garfield, Kearny, Morse, and Twain may benefit from more targeted or different Promise outreach efforts.

Metrics

1. Population Context: Recent high school graduates – first-time entrants – have accounted for about half of all first-time to college students over the last three years.

The overall number of first-time to college students (which includes those who graduated high school two or more years ago) has grown each of the last three years, from 6,160 in 2020-21 to 7,141 in 2022-223.




Figure 1. First-time Students, Entrants, and non-Entrants

2. First Time Entrant Counts by School District: There were 3,620 First Time Entrants in 2022-23, 7% more than the prior year. SDUSD public schools accounted for 1,436 of these students (40% of First Time Entrants).

SDUSD Public and Charter schools accounted for just under half of First Time Entrants in 2022-23 (46%). Schools from districts outside of the immediate San Diego area accounted for the next largest group of entrants in 2022-23 (850 students, or 23%), followed by Poway Unified (470 students, or 13%) and Sweetwater Union (306, or 8%).

First Time Entrants are first-time to college students who enrolled at San Diego City, Mesa, or Miramar Colleges within one year of high school graduation.




Figure 2. Percent of First Time Entrants by District, First Time Entrants 2022-23

3. SDUSD First Time Entrant Rate: About one in five high school seniors enroll at San Diego City, Mesa, or Miramar College in the year following high school graduation.

Data regarding the number of high school seniors at SDUSD schools is from the <u>California</u> Department of Education Dataguest.

Entrant rates reported in this briefing are significantly lower than previously reported: the most recent High School Pipeline report (December 2019) showed roughly 1 in 3 SDUSD high school graduates enrolling at San Diego City, Mesa, or Miramar College in the year following high school graduation. Differences in reported entrant rates are likely due to:

- Previous reporting likely included dually/concurrently enrolled students as first-time to college students (incorrectly increasing numerator of historical data)
- Current reporting is challenged by incomplete graduation year data (incorrectly lowering numerator of new data). The impact of this challenge is likely minimal: there are 196 SDUSD students with unreported high school graduation data that could be part of the cohorts of 4,488 Entrants across the last three years (shown in Table 4 below), or about 4%.

Gaps in application data from Campus Solutions are supplemented by data obtained from SDUSD.

The SDUSD high schools from which the highest **percent** of 2022 seniors enrolled at San Diego City, Mesa, or Miramar Colleges within one year of graduation were **Kearny** (38%), **Mira Mesa** (33%), **Clairemont** (32%), and **University City** (30%).





Figure 4. High Schools with Highest Entrant Count

The SDUSD high schools from which the highest **count** of 2022 seniors enrolled at San Diego City, Mesa, or Miramar Colleges within one year of graduation were **Mira Mesa** (186), University City (135), SDHS (128), and Kearny (121).



Entrant rates vary widely by high school. Sites geographically near a credit college, such as Mira Mesa and Kearny, show the highest re-enrollment rates. These sites also have relatively high enrollment (564 and 320 seniors in 2022, respectively), leading to a high number of First Time Entrants from those sites.

High enrollment sites with low entrant rates may benefit from more or different outreach services than they currently receive. These sites are listed in Table 5.

Each SDUSD school site represents unique opportunities and challenges for Outreach. For example, sites such as Morse and Henry likely demonstrate low entrant rates due to geographical proximity to other community college districts.

In Table 6 below, high schools that yield large numbers of Entrants are highlighted in green. The sites with the 10 highest entrant rates each year are highlighted in blue.

4. Entrant Rate by College: In 2022-23, Entrant rates to each of the credit colleges from their service area high schools ranged between 13% and 20% (City: 13%, Mesa: 18%, Miramar: 20%).

Table 7 below shows entrant rates by college. "Entrants" indicates the number of students from each college's feeder high school that enrolled at that college as First Time students in the year following high school graduation. "Seniors" indicates the numbers of seniors from those high schools (includes SDUSD Public schools only).

Note that the Total Entrant Rate is higher than the Entrant Rate for each college. This is because seniors from one college's service area may enroll at one of the other two credit colleges.

Seniors from high schools in each college's service area primarily enroll as Entrants at that college: between 68% and 90% of First Time Entrants enrolled at their service area college. However, there are many Entrants who enroll at one or both of the other two colleges in the same academic year.

Figure 5. 2022-23 High School Pipeline Overview




Table 8 below shows the number of Entrants who enrolled at each college by service area.

- Each column shows the college at which Entrants enrolled.
- Each row shows the service area to which Entrants' high schools belonged.
- The yellow-highlighted cells indicate the number of Entrants from each college's service area who enrolled at that college.

For example, there were 1,434 Entrants from the high school class of 2022. Of these, 418 entrants were from high schools in the City College service area, 505 were from the Mesa College service area, and 511 were from the Miramar College service area. Of the 1,434 Entrants, 634 enrolled at City, 1,006 enrolled at Mesa, and 521 enrolled at Miramar.



Figure 6 below shows the high school pipeline of high school seniors in City, Mesa, and Miramar Service Areas.

- The number of seniors in each college's service area is shown at the left of the figure (City: 2,446, Mesa: 2,566, Miramar: 1,777).
- The number of seniors from each college's service area who enroll at one of the credit colleges in the year after high school graduation is shown in the middle along the purple path (418 from City Service Area, 505 from Mesa Service Area, 866 from Miramar Service Area).
- The number of students who enroll at each college within one year of high school graduation is shown at the right of the figure (City: 634, Mesa: 1,006, Miramar: 521).

Figure 5 excludes charter schools such as High Tech High from each college's service area.

Table 9 shows the percent of Entrants from each service area who enrolled at each college in their first year. For example, for students who graduated high school in 2022:

- 77% of the 418 SDUSD Entrants from high schools in the City College Service Area enrolled at City College (321 students). 50% of the 418 SDUSD Entrants from the City College Service Area enrolled at Mesa (208 students), and 18% enrolled at Miramar (77 students).
- 90% of the **505** SDUSD Entrants from high schools in the Mesa College Service Area enrolled at Mesa College (454 students). 28% of the **505** SDUSD Entrants from the Mesa College Service Area enrolled at City (140 students), and 19% enrolled at Miramar (95 students).
- 68% of the **511** SDUSD Entrants from high schools in the Miramar College Service Area enrolled at Miramar College (349 students). 34% of the **511** SDUSD Entrants from the Miramar College Service Area enrolled at City (173 students), and 67% enrolled at Mesa (344 students).

The sum of the percents of students who enroll at each college exceeds 100% because students enroll at multiple colleges. For example, for Entrants who graduated high school in 2022, 44%+70%+36% = 150% - this indicates that about half of this group enrolled at multiple colleges.

5. Promise Participation among First Time Entrants: Of the 1,434 First Time Entrants from SDUSD Public Schools in 2022-23, 828 participated in Promise, or 58%. This is an increase from the prior two years (2020-21: 53%, 2021-22: 51%).

Note that Table 10 below includes Promise students who were First Time Entrants from SDUSD Public schools – meaning they were first-time to college students in the year following high school graduation. A number of students enter Promise as non-first time students, first-time students who graduated high school several years ago, First Time Entrants from outside the region, and degree holders.

In 2022-23, more than half of First Time Entrants from 15 of the 22 SDUSD Public high schools participated in Promise in their first year as college students at SDCCD. Sites where fewer than half of First Time Entrants participated in Promise and where students may benefit from extended or differentiated Promise outreach are listed in Table 11 below. 6. First Time Entrants by Gender and Ethnicity: Nearly half of first-time Entrants in 2022-23 were Latinx (47%), and male students account for a lightly larger percent (50%) than female students (48%).

Compared to all other students enrolled at the credit colleges, First Time Entrants were more likely to be Latinx (+9%) and less likely to be white (-8%). First Time Entrants were also slightly more likely to be male (+2) than all other students.

Differences between First Time
Entrants and all other students
across the credit colleges were
reflected at City and Mesa Colleges.
At Miramar College, gender
differences were not significant.
Entrants to Miramar College were
as likely to be Latinx as the rest of
Miramar College students, but more
likely to be Asian (+6%) and less
likely to be white (-8%).
