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| <p><b>*~ 365A Assessment Tools Used on Adult Offender Populations</b><br/><b>16 - 18 hours lab, 0.3 units</b><br/><b>Grade Only</b></p> <p><b>REQUISITES:</b><br/><i>Limitation on Enrollment:</i> This course is not open to students with previous credit for Administration of Justice 365.<br/>This course teaches students how to identify and assess levels of risk and criminogenic needs in offender populations. Students learn to administer the Federal Salient Factor (FSF), Level of Service Inventory (LSI) and Adult Substance User Survey (ASUS) instruments while using motivational interviewing techniques. By analyzing various archetypal patterns found in the great civilizations and tribal cultures of the world, students understand both the uniqueness of each culture's world view and the commonality of human mythological conceptions. Literature and the arts are used to demonstrate these cultures' mythic ideas.
