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# San Diego Community College District Overview Academic Year 2015-2016

As the second-largest of California's 72 community college districts, the San Diego Community College District (SDCCD) serves approximately 100,000 students annually at its three credit colleges, San Diego City College, Mesa College, Miramar College, and six campuses of San Diego Continuing Education. The three credit colleges offer associate degrees, and Continuing Education and the credit colleges offer career technical certificates that prepare students for transfer to universities and/or career pathways with higher paying jobs. In addition, Mesa College now offers a bachelor's degree in Health Information Management as part of California's Baccalaureate Pilot Program. The SDCCD maintains active partnerships with local industry, the community, the military, and educational institutions to ensure students have clear pathways to careers and the next stage of their education. A number of the District's programs are unique to the San Diego region, including the Center for Competitive and Applied Technologies, the Southern California Biotechnology Center, the San Diego Regional Public Safety Training Institute, the Workplace Learning Resource Center, the KSDS-FM jazz radio station, and the Accelerated College Program (taught at area high schools). In addition, all three SDCCD colleges and Continuing Education were named a 2015 Military Friendly School by Victory Media. Collectively, the District serves over 12,000 active-duty military personnel, veterans, and dependents. The SDCCD and its graduates have a combined economic benefit to the region of \$5.7 billion annually – 98 percent of the District's students remain in the region after completing their education. The SDCCD is governed by its five-member, locally elected Board of Trustees and three student members serving on a rotating basis. Shared governance activities involve faculty, students, and staff in the development of solutions to key policy and budget issues. The trustees are elected in even-numbered years to four-year terms by the voters of San Diego. The Chancellor, the District's chief executive officer, is responsible for carrying out the policies approved by the Board of Trustees.

Major Construction Projects/Improvements Underway or Planned for the Year

The San Diego Community College District's \$1.555 billion Propositions S and N construction bond program is providing for new, state-of-the-art instructional and career training facilities, major renovations, public safety and accessibility enhancements, parking, and infrastructure projects at City, Mesa and Miramar Colleges, and six Continuing Education campuses. All construction is completed in accordance with the District's Green Building Policy and Major Renovation Standards. The policy calls for four key performance goals, and includes formal pursuit of Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) certification. Data from the California Center for Sustainable Energy show that the

District is generating more renewable energy than any other higher education institution in SDG&E territory. Combined, installations across the District represent the generation of 4,876,129 kilowatt hours (kWh) of renewable energy each year. In 2015-16, SDCCD was honored by the Green California Schools & Community Colleges for its extensive efforts at conserving energy.

Established in 1914 as the first community college in San Diego and the fifth in California, San Diego City College is the District's flagship college. The multicultural campus is home to approximately 16,000 students each fall and spring semester, and offers 200 degrees, 500 certificate programs and 1,800 classes. As the educational cornerstone of downtown San Diego, the 60-acre urban campus is a short walk from the City College Trolley Station, worldrenown Balboa Park, the Gaslamp Quarter, PETCO Park, and San Diego Bay. The college is completing the largest transformation in its history, including the addition of five new classroom buildings. As the first college in San Diego County to start a Sustainable Urban Agriculture program, the Seeds@City Urban Farm serves as an outdoor classroom and Farmer's Market. In 2016, City College faculty and staff hosted its 2nd Annual Social Justice and Education Conference to advance the role of social justice in academics. Additionally, the Institute for Human Development opens doors into the community through its Community Health, Youth Development, Mental Health, Peace Studies and Futures Studies programs. City College alumni are employed throughout the region as business leaders, radio/TV broadcasters, biologists, cosmetologists, fitness specialists, computer programmers, and child development teachers. Nursing graduates work in every major health care facility in the region. City College also offers Career-Technical/Vocational training for in-demand fields such as Environmental Control Technology, Biotechnology, Computer Information Systems, Digital Music Technology, and Machine Technology. Additionally, the vibrant Visual and Performing Arts department offers theater, dance, music, fine art, and award-winning graphic design and photography programs. Our Art Gallery and Luxe Gallery showcase both campus and community works. Offering exceptional student support services and excellence in education, City College remains a number one choice for a quality education.

# Major Construction Projects/Improvements Underway or Planned for the Year

Propositions S & N-funded projects for the 60-acre City College include six new instructional and career training facilities, eight major renovations, and new parking, public safety, and infrastructure projects. In 2016, the renovation of the "C" Building was completed, providing a state-of-the-art home for Radio/TV/Journalism, Dramatic Arts, Dance, and Music. The project is tracking a Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) Silver certification. The Math and Social Sciences Building and the "M" Building renovation were awarded LEED Silver certifications. Designs for renovations of the "A," "D," and "T" Buildings are awaiting approval by the State Architect.

# Major Construction Projects/Improvements Underway or Planned for the Year

Situated on 104 acres, Mesa College is one of the largest community colleges in California. Propositions S & N-funded projects for Mesa include six new academic and career training facilities, two campus support facilities, five major renovation projects, and numerous infrastructure, parking, and public safety projects. In 2016 the Exercise Science Center was completed as the new home for the School of Exercise Science, Health Education, Dance and Athletics. The project is tracking a Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) Silver certification. The new Mesa Commons was also completed. This two-story, 60,000 square foot building houses food service, bookstore, coffee bar, convenience store, campus stockroom, reprographic services, and the culinary arts/culinary management program which includes a student-run restaurant and roof top garden. The project is on track to obtain a LEED Silver certification is the end of 2016. In 2015, the Social and Behavioral Sciences Building was awarded a LEED Silver certification. The Math+Science Complex was honored by the San Diego Architectural Foundation with an Orchid Award for its distinctive exterior landscaping.

San Diego Miramar College, located in the Mira Mesa/Scripps Ranch suburban area of San Diego along the I-15 corridor, offers 67 academic majors, 93 career technical education certificates, and comprehensive transfer programs to students looking to attend UC, CSU and private universities. The College serves approximately 22,000 students annually. Partnerships with local industry and the City and County of San Diego help San Diego Miramar College prepare students for high demand and well-paying careers in the highly competitive labor market, including biotechnology, paralegal, aviation, automotive, diesel, and alternative fuels technologies. San Diego Miramar College is home to the Southern California Biotechnology Center, Advanced Transportation and Technology Center, and San Diego Regional Public Safety Institute. Since 1969, the college has provided training for nearly all law enforcement officers and firefighters within San Diego County. The Public Safety Institute also trains EMTs and offers the only open water lifeguard degree program in the world. This list of campus upgrades over the past few years include: state-of-the-art science building; automotive; heavy duty advanced transportation; fitness/athletics/health; humanities/arts and business/math classroom buildings; fire science/EMT training center; MTS transit center; and a 100,000 square foot library/learning resources center and student union are among major facilities recently completed to meet the comprehensive instructional and student service needs of its growing student body. San Diego Miramar College fields five intercollegiate sports teams.

# Major Construction Projects/Improvements Underway or Planned for the Year

The 120-acre San Diego Miramar College originally opened as a training facility for local law enforcement personnel and firefighters in 1969 and has grown into one of the fastest-growing colleges in the county. Propositions S & N-funded projects for Miramar College include eight new instructional and career training facilities, seven new campus support facilities, five major renovation projects, a major public safety project, and numerous infrastructure projects. In 2015-16, the expansion to the Science Building was completed, as was the new Vernal Pools and Interpretive Trails project. Construction of a tactical training facility as part of the A-200 (Police Academy) building expansion continued. The new facility will be open for the fall 2016 semester. An expansion of the maintenance facility will also be completed. In 2015, three Miramar facilities were awarded LEED Silver certifications: the Library/Learning Resource Center (LLRC), the Student Services Center, and the Science Building expansion project. The new Administration Building was awarded a LEED Gold.

San Diego Continuing Education (SDCE) is the adult education division of SDCCD. Approximately 42,000 students are served each academic year at six main campuses and many community locations. Continuing Education is one of the oldest and largest noncredit institutions in the nation, serving San Diegans since 1914. Students are among the most diverse in California—culturally, ethnically, and educationally. Noncredit classes are offered at no cost, and students who enroll in classes have a variety of educational and personal goals. Programs address essential areas of adult education including short-term job training in priority industry sectors (e.g. Information and Communication Technologies, Clean Energy, Health Care and Advanced Manufacturing), career development, English as a Second Language, adult basic skills, an Emeritus program for age 55+, parenting, and Disability Support Programs and Services. Additionally, a Community Education program offers low fee classes for professional and personal enrichment, and employers benefit from customized workforce training through our Employee Training Institute.

SDCE was one of the first noncredit institutions in the U.S. to be separately accredited by the Western Association of Schools and Colleges (WASC). The administrators, faculty, and staff are highly qualified with many holding master's degrees and several holding doctoral degrees.

# Major Construction Projects/Improvements Underway or Planned for the Year

San Diego Continuing Education is made up of seven unique campuses located throughout the City. Propositions S & N-funded projects for Continuing Education include the construction of six new campus facilities, a major wing extension for the Educational Cultural Complex (ECC), a campus seismic retrofit, and land acquisition required to complete campus expansions as promised to the voters. In 2015-16, the new César E. Chávez campus was completed. The facility houses classrooms for vocational training, English as a Second Language, Adult Basic Education, high school equivalency preparation classes, Business Information Technology, Parent Education and Emeritus programs. The new building also includes space for a Small Business Incubator. The facility is tracking a Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) Silver certification. A new parking structure was constructed adjacent to the campus.

# **Definition of Terms** San Diego Community College District

#### Headcount

The individual count of students, or unduplicated headcount. Drops, never attends, and cancelled classes are excluded. Apprenticeship, contract, and fee-only students are also excluded.

#### **Basic Skills Courses**

Courses in English and math that are one level or more below transfer level English and math. Also included are all ESOL courses.

#### Contact Hours

Number of student contact hours for all methods of accounting including: WSCH, DSCH, PA, PO, PQ, IS, and IX.

## Degrees, Certificates, and Diplomas

The number of degrees, certificates, and diplomas awarded in Summer 2015, Fall 2015, and Spring 2016.

## Enrollment - College

The number of seats enrolled, or duplicated headcount. Drops, never attends, cancelled, and tutoring classes are excluded.

## Enrollment - Continuing Education

The number of seats enrolled, or duplicated headcount. Less than one attendance hour, drops, never attends, and cancelled classes are excluded.

## First Generation Students

Students who have identified themselves as the first generation in their family to attend college.

# FTES

The total number of full-time equivalent students enrolled. Includes non-residents. Excludes non-state supported, cancelled, and tutoring classes. F-Factor is included.

# Retention Rate

The percentage of students who complete a course with a grade of A, B, C, D, F, P, NP, I or RD out of total official census enrollments. Tutoring and cancelled classes are excluded.

#### Students Receiving Financial Aid

The number of students who were enrolled as of official census and received financial aid.

#### Success Rate

The percentage of students who complete a course with a grade of A, B, C, or P out of total official census enrollments. Tutoring, noncredit, and cancelled classes are excluded.

# Transfers

The total number of students who transferred to a 4-year institution and were enrolled at an SDCCD college at any time within six semesters prior to transferring (including stop outs). The student must also have completed 12 or more transferrable units from any one of the SDCCD credit colleges within six years prior to transferring to a 4-year institution.
