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San Diego Community College District Overview Academic Year 2009-2010

The San Diego Community College District serves an estimated 50,000 students at three colleges in San Diego: City College, Mesa College and Miramar College. The colleges offer associate degrees in arts and sciences that transfer to four-year institutions, as well as certificates in professional occupational programs. A number of programs are unique to the San Diego region, including the Center for Competitive and Applied Technologies, the Southern California Biotechnology Center, the San Diego Regional Public Safety Training Institute, the Workplace Learning Resource Center, KSDS-FM all-jazz radio station, and the Accelerated College Program (taught at area high schools).

An additional 50,000 students enroll in non-credit classes at six San Diego Continuing Education (CE) campuses and approximately 200 community facilities throughout the city. Local residents enroll in more than 15,000 classes offered including classes for the G.E.D. program, English as a Second Language, and career/job training programs. Continuing Education also offers adults the opportunity to renew their learning experiences through noncredit vocational, basic skills, life skills and enrichment classes.

The District also provides education and training to over 50,000 members of the U.S. military stationed at some 30 military installations throughout the nation.

SDCCD is governed by its five-member, locally elected Board of Trustees and three student members serving on a rotating basis. Shared governance activities involve faculty, students and staff in the development of solutions to key policy and budget issues. The trustees are elected in even-numbered years to four-year terms by the voters of San Diego. The Chancellor, the District's chief executive officer, is responsible for carrying out the policies approved by the Board of Trustees.

Major Construction Projects/Improvements Underway or Planned for the Year

The \$834,000 District Service Center renovation was completed in March of 2010, adding renovated space for the District's maintenance department's various trades, new HVAC units and overall remodels to offices and restrooms.

The District entered into a 20-year Power Purchase Agreement that will provide photovoltaic arrays throughout the district, generating 2.4 MW and reducing energy costs by over \$100,000 annually. The District also implemented standardization of the Calsense irrigation control system districtwide, which will help conserve millions of gallons of water each year.

As the educational cornerstone of downtown San Diego, the 60-acre City College campus is a short walk from the bustling Gaslamp Quarter, Balboa Park, PETCO Park, San Diego Bay, and the City College Trolley Station. The multicultural campus is home to more than 18,000 students and offers 99 majors, 129 certificate programs, and over 1,500 classes each semester. Leaders in innovation, the college has recently started programs in both Futures Studies and Peace Studies. City graduates are employed throughout our community as nurses, journalists, electricians, cosmetologists, youth development workers, fitness specialists, counselors, machine techs, and radio/TV broadcasters. Additionally, the vibrant Visual and Performing Arts department offers theater, dance, music, fine art, and award-winning graphic design and photography programs. Exceptional student support services and excellence in education for more than 95 years keeps City College as the number one choice for a quality education.

Major Construction Projects/Improvements Underway or Planned for the Year

2009-10 marked the completions of the L Building renovation (Academic Success Center), P Building renovation (Health, Exercise Science and Athletic Building), and the 88,000 sq. ft. Career Technology Center (CTC). The CTC is home to the expanded Nursing, Cosmetology, and Photography and Digital Arts departments, as well as a new parking structure and a new home for College Police.

In 2010-11, construction will begin for three new instructional and career training facilities: the new Business Technology Building, which will consist of approximately 40,000 sq. ft. of new space for the Business Department, including Business Studies and Business and Computer Systems; the new Arts & Humanities Building, will consist of approximately 70,000 sq. ft. of space for Visual Arts, English, ESOL, Speech and Foreign Language and other programs; and the new Math & Social Sciences facility to house Math, Black & Chicano Studies, Behavioral Sciences, Political Science and History. These three buildings are targeted for completion in Spring 2012. The design for the new Science Building will be completed in early 2010-2011.

Among the largest community colleges in California and the nation, San Diego Mesa College is a fully accredited two-year college offering more than 170 associate degree and certificate programs. With its robust language, art and music programs and rigorous math and science curricula, Mesa ranks as San Diego's top transfer institution. The college also serves as an important economic catalyst for the region. Its career programs include allied health fields, biopharmaceutical, multimedia, animal health technology, American Sign Language, hospitality, fashion, architecture, interior design, a very active climate of diversity and vibrant student life. Situated on a sprawling, suburban 104-acre mesa in the geographic center of San Diego, the college's small classes, exemplary student support services, outstanding faculty, and reputation for quality offer an unparalleled academic experience.

Major Construction Projects/Improvements Underway or Planned for the Year

2009-10 marked the completion of the East Campus gateway, which included construction of the Allied Health Education and Training Facility, the east campus road realignment, two parking lots, an 1,100-space parking structure, and a new police station. The campus also completed the Rosa Parks Memorial Transit Center, an all-weather track and field facility, an IT infrastructure project and installed a temporary chiller plant to serve the I-300 building. Student Services personnel were relocated for future expansion activities which include a new Student Services facility which started initial construction activities in April 2010.

2010-11 will see the completion of the Mesa College Design Center - home to the Architecture, Landscape Architecture, Building Construction Technology, and Interior Design programs. The hardscape for the new east entrance will be completed. Ten additional modular classrooms will be placed at Modular Village and numerous relocations will take place in the summer and fall to prepare for the demolition of the F-100, F-200 and J-200 buildings in December, clearing the way for construction of the future Math and Science Building (the largest project within the Propositions S and N program at 200,000 sq. ft.).

San Diego Miramar College, located in the fast-growing Mira Mesa/Scripps Ranch suburban area of San Diego along the I-15 corridor, offers 137 certificates, associate degrees, and comprehensive transfer programs to students transferring to UC, CSU and private institutions. The College serves 13,000 students and is one of the fastest growing colleges within San Diego County. Partnerships with local industry and the City and County of San Diego help San Diego Miramar College prepare students for high demand and well-paying careers in the highly competitive labor market, including biotechnology, paralegal, aviation, automotive, diesel, and alternative fuels technologies. San Diego Miramar College is home to the Southern California Biotechnology Center, Advanced Transportation and Energy Center, and San Diego Regional Public Safety Institute. San Diego Continuing Education is the largest institution of its kind in the nation. It is one of the few noncredit institutions that is separately accredited by the Western Association of Schools and Colleges (WASC). Continuing Education offers no cost noncredit career technical and college preparation courses. It also offers low-cost fee courses in life and health enrichment programs. Finally, it offers unique customized training programs designed specifically for the needs of area companies. Continuing Education serves approximately 100,000 students each year through 6 campuses and over 300 community and neighborhood sites. It offers 35 Certificates of Competencies designed to enhance student income and employment potential. Continuing Education students are among the most diverse in California with more than 150 different countries represented. The Continuing Education faculty is highly qualified with the majority holding master's degrees and several holding doctoral degrees.

Major Construction Projects/ Improvements Underway or Planned for the Year

The new 52,600 square foot Skills Center at the Educational Cultural Complex completed in September 2009 and opened for fall classes. The largest automotive technology training center in the country, the new Skills Center provides expanded space for Automotive Repair, Upholstery (auto, marine and furniture), Reprographic Services and Electronic Repair. In addition, there are classes for Business Information Technology and a new Cisco Lab.

Design activities continue this year for the new Cesar Chavez Center in Barrio Logan, the new North City classroom building and parking structure on Aero Drive, the new Linda Vista facility adjacent to Mesa College and the Wing Expansion project at the Educational Cultural Complex. All of the projects are expected to break ground in early 2011.
