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San Diego Community College District Overview *Academic Year 2010-2011*

The San Diego Community College District (SDCCD) serves approximately 125,000 students in San Diego and 140,000 members of the U.S. military throughout the nation.

The three colleges in San Diego, City College, Mesa College and Miramar College, serve approximately 45,000 students locally. The colleges offer Associate degrees in arts and sciences that transfer to four-year institutions, as well as certificates in professional occupational programs. A number of programs are unique to the San Diego region, including the Center for Competitive and Applied Technologies, the Southern California Biotechnology Center, the San Diego Regional Public Safety Training Institute, the Workplace Learning Resource Center, KSDS-FM all-jazz radio station, and the Accelerated College Program (taught at area high schools).

An additional 55,000 students enroll in non-credit classes at six San Diego Continuing Education (CE) campuses and over 200 community facilities throughout the city. Local residents enroll in more than 15,000 classes offered including classes for the G.E.D. program, English as a Second Language, and career/job training programs. Continuing Education also offers adults the opportunity to renew their learning experiences through non-credit vocational, basic skills, life skills and enrichment classes.

The District also provides education and training to approximately 140,000 members of the U.S. military stationed at some 30 military installations throughout the nation.

SDCCD is governed by its five-member, locally elected Board of Trustees and three student members serving on a rotating basis. Shared governance activities involve faculty, students and staff in the development of solutions to key policy and budget issues. The trustees are elected in even-numbered years to four-year terms by the voters of San Diego. The Chancellor, the District's chief executive officer, is responsible for carrying out the policies approved by the Board of Trustees.

Major Construction Projects/Improvements Underway or Planned for the Year

A districtwide solar initiative has been completed that includes a 2.4 megawatt Power Purchase Agreement saving SDCCD more than \$100,000 annually in utility costs. Combined installations across the District represent the generation of 4,876,129 kWh of renewable energy each year – saving more than 3,500 metric tons of CO_2 annually.

The use of our Calsense irrigation control systems, coupled with the move to droughttolerant and native landscaping, saves the District millions of gallons of water annually,

enabling the District to meet and exceed local water conservation mandates and save hundreds of thousands in water fees each year.

Technology upgrades continue to be implemented throughout the District as a result of Propositions S and N.

As the educational cornerstone of downtown San Diego, the 60-acre City College campus is a short walk from the world-renown Balboa Park, the bustling Gaslamp Quarter, PETCO Park, San Diego Bay, and the City College Trolley Station. The multicultural campus is home to approximately 30,000 students and offers more than 200 majors and certificate programs and approximately 1,500 classes each semester. Leaders in innovation, the college offers Futures Studies, Peace Studies and recently launched its Sustainable Urban Agriculture program with a focus toward improving the health of our environment and community. City graduates are employed throughout our community as nurses, journalists, electricians, cosmetologists, youth development workers, fitness specialists, counselors, machine techs, and radio/TV broadcasters. Additionally, the vibrant Visual and Performing Arts department offers theater, dance, music, fine art, and award-winning graphic design and photography programs. Offering exceptional student support services and excellence in education for more than 96 years, City College remains a number one choice for a quality education.

Major Construction Projects/Improvements Underway or Planned for the Year

In 2010-2011, construction started for three new instructional and career training facilities. These include the Math & Social Sciences building, which is targeting completion for September 2012 and is on track to obtain a Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) Silver certification by the U.S. Green Building Council; and the Business Technology and Arts & Humanities Buildings, both targeted for completion in March 2013 and expected to obtain LEED Gold certifications. The new Central Plant was completed as part of a massive \$19.4 million infrastructure upgrade and construction began on the new Science Building, a LEED Silver-bound project.

Design and programming continue for the renovations of the A, C, M and T Buildings, along with the D Building roof and the Child Development Center.

In 2011, City College projects were the recipients of two prestigious awards. The Career Technology Center won the "Best Overall Sustainable Design" by the California Higher Education Sustainability Conference. The campus Facility Master Plan won "Best Master Plan" by the California Community College Facility Coalition.

Among the largest community colleges in California and the nation, San Diego Mesa College is a fully accredited two-year college offering more than 170 associate degree and certificate programs. With its robust language, art and music programs and rigorous math and science curricula, Mesa ranks as San Diego's top transfer institution. The college also serves as an important economic catalyst for the region. Its career programs include allied health fields, biopharmaceutical, multimedia, animal health technology, American Sign Language, hospitality, fashion, architecture, interior design and a very active climate of diversity and vibrant student life. Situated on a sprawling, suburban 104-acre mesa in the geographic center of San Diego, the college's small classes, exemplary student support services, outstanding faculty, and reputation for quality offer an unparalleled academic experience.

Major Construction Projects/Improvements Underway or Planned for the Year

In 2010-2011, Mesa College completed the Central Plant, Modular Village, and the new Mesa College Design Center; a renovation of a former six-building elementary school to house the Architecture and Environmental Design programs.

Construction began on the new Student Services Center, scheduled for completion in spring of 2012, and the future Math & Natural Sciences building, which is the largest project within the Propositions S and N construction bond program and is scheduled for completion in summer of 2013. Both of these projects are on track to obtain a Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) Silver certification by the U.S. Green Building Council. Infrastructure upgrades will continue, and construction of the new stadium restrooms is planned for late 2011/early 2012.

A Design/Build contract was awarded for the Social and Behavioral Sciences building, although construction won't begin until summer 2012. Design and programming activities continue for the Fitness Center, Instructional Technology Building, the Cafeteria/Bookstore and the Fine Arts facility.

San Diego Miramar College, located in the fast-growing Mira Mesa/Scripps Ranch suburban area of San Diego along the I-15 corridor, offers 137 certificates, Associate degrees, and comprehensive transfer programs to students transferring to UC, CSU and private institutions. The College serves approximately 24,000 students and is one of the fastest growing colleges within San Diego County. Partnerships with local industry and the City and County of San Diego help San Diego Miramar College prepare students for high demand and well-paying careers in the highly competitive labor market, including biotechnology, paralegal, aviation, automotive, diesel, and alternative fuels technologies. San Diego Miramar College is home to the Southern California Biotechnology Center, Advanced Transportation and Energy Center, and San Diego Regional Public Safety Institute. Since 1969, the college has provided training for nearly all law enforcement officers and firefighters within San Diego County. The Institute also trains EMTs and offers the only open water lifeguard degree program in the world. State-of-the-art science, automotive, fitness/athletics/health, humanities/arts and business/math classroom buildings, and a 100,000 square foot library/learning resources center and student union are among major facilities recently completed or currently under construction to meet the comprehensive instructional and student service needs of its growing student body.

Major Construction Projects/Improvements Underway or Planned for the Year

In 2010-2011, Miramar celebrated the completion of the Humanities & Arts and the Math & Business Buildings. The new police station and parking structure project was completed in late summer 2011. The Library Learning Resource Center is on track to be completed in late 2011/early 2012.

New projects beginning construction in 2011 include the Cafeteria/Bookstore and Student Services Center, the College Service Center and the expansions of the Heavy Duty Advanced Transportation Technology and Aviation Maintenance Technology Centers. All of these new projects will be using reclaimed water for landscaping and irrigation. The new Student Services Center will also use reclaimed water for flushing toilets, saving millions of gallons of potable water. A solar thermal energy system will be installed at the Ned Baumer Aquatic Center to use solar power to heat the swimming pools.

San Diego Continuing Education (SDCE) is the adult education division of SDCCD. Nearly 55,000 students are served per academic year at six main campuses and many community locations. Continuing Education is one of the oldest and largest non-credit institutions in the nation, serving a diverse population of San Diegans since 1914. Students are among the most diverse in California—culturally, ethnically, and educationally.

Non-credit classes are offered at no cost, and students who enroll in classes have a variety of educational and personal goals. Programs address essential areas of adult education including short-term job training, career development, English as a Second Language, adult basic skills, an Emeritus program for age 55+, parenting, and Disability Support Programs and Services. Additionally, a community education program offers low fee classes for professional and personal enrichment.

SDCE was one of the only non-credit institutions in the U.S. to be separately accredited by the Western Association of Schools and Colleges (WASC). The administrators, faculty, and staff are highly qualified with many holding master's degrees and several holding doctoral degrees.

Major Construction Projects/ Improvements Underway or Planned for the Year

Construction began in 2010 on the parking structure component of the North City Campus; the main classroom building begins construction in fall 2011. The North City Campus, serving as the Campus of Excellence for Multimedia and Innovation, is expected to obtain a Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) Gold certification from the U.S. Green Building Council.

Construction also began on the Mesa College campus for our new Clairemont/Linda Vista Continuing Education facility. This facility, along with the wing expansion at the Educational Cultural Complex and the consolidation of the Centre City and Cesar Chavez campuses into a single facility serving as the future Campus of Excellence for Allied Health Career Training, are on track for a LEED Silver certification.

All of these new campuses should be completed by late 2012.
